I was born into a family of physicians in Uppsala, Sweden, moving to the United States with them as a child. I grew up familiar with hospitals and research laboratories where many days were spent as my parents worked long hours. I was often entertained by helping the laboratory technicians looking at everything I could find under a microscope. Long summers were spent in Sweden with house pets and on farms. A future in medicine and a love of animals was fostered at an early age.

Like many future veterinarians, I enjoyed spending time with animals of all sorts, working at several veterinary hospitals as soon as I could. My love of problem-solving brought me to science and veterinary studies at the University of Illinois, where I received both research and clinical training. I completed both undergraduate degrees in biochemistry and biology and then a Doctorate of Veterinary Medicine at the University of Illinois.

Following veterinary school, I interned at a veterinary specialty hospital in San Diego, California. I learned that I had a passion for dermatology, which allowed me to combine my research interest in immunology while working directly with people and their pets. At this time there were only 5 residency positions in veterinary dermatology in the United States. My residency in veterinary dermatology at the University of Florida was not only rigorous but also provided a wealth of unusual cases to investigate. Unusual parasites as well as unusual infectious diseases were seen regularly. Veterinary dermatology is the most common field in veterinary medicine that addresses allergic disease, which most commonly manifests as skin disease in animals (rarely showing respiratory or mucosal symptoms). Dog and cat allergies will manifest what veterinarians refer to as "atopic dermatitis," having similarities with the disease in humans. Fortunately most of our veterinary patients will respond very well to immunotherapy with minimal side effects if treatments are started early. Managing these patients (and parents) can be challenging. Veterinary dermatologists also take on the role of veterinary allergist and veterinary ear specialist. After I passed the Veterinary Dermatology Board Exam and became certified, there were less than 200 veterinarians in the American College of Veterinary Dermatology.

After my residency, I returned to Illinois where I helped found the Animal Dermatology Center of Chicago. It is still the only dermatology/allergy specialty

clinic in Chicago. It is located at 3123 N. Clybourn St. I became a member of the Chicago Dermatological Society that same year (1999).

Veterinary dermatologists treat all types of skin except human. The diseases span from mild infections to neoplasms, congenital abnormalities, autoimmune disease, tumors, and more. In the last few years our specialty has struggled with the veterinary variant of methicillin resistant Staphylococcus infections. Fortunately MRSA is still uncommon in our patients. Most of my patients are dogs and cats, but I also consult on more specialized animals. I have worked with dolphins at the Shedd Aquarium who need to regulate the complexities of their skin in salt water. I have consulted at the Lincoln Park Zoo on panthers, foxes, and bears. These animal patients are challenging as they are often not amenable to standard treatments such as baths and lotions. I also work closely with other veterinary specialists in surgery, internal medicine, neurology, oncology, radiation oncology, cardiology, ophthalmology, dentistry, and radiology.

Practicing veterinary dermatology combines the best of both clinical and research worlds. The skin affects many other systems in the body. Our specialty is dynamic and full of constant questions. We have been fortunate to participate in many clinical trials with groundbreaking medications to help patients with diseases that can be very debilitating. The wide variety of animal patients means each species has its own puzzle, with different knowns and unknowns. New therapies appear all the time. I have to be a scientific dermatologist as well as a caretaker, and I love it.

In addition to working and managing the clinic, I am on the editorial board of the journal "Veterinary Dermatology." I also have served on numerous national committees. I have authored several chapters in veterinary dermatology and veterinary medical text books and lectured both in the United States and abroad. I absolutely adore my job and love working with animals and the many humans attached to them.

As for myself, I am on temporary personal pet hiatus. My husband Ron, who is an evolutionary biologist, and I are raising our 7-year-old boy/girl twins and their 5-year-old brother. Our pets at the moment consist of fish and frogs who live happily in a tank at home. I continue to enjoy all the patients that I see every day and the wonderful owners who care for them.



IN PASSING: LAWBENCE M. SOLOMON M.I

Lawrence M. Solomon, M.D. received his B.A. degree from McGill University in Montreal, Canada and M.D. degree from the University of Geneva in Switzerland. He took his internship at the Jewish General Hospital and his residency in internal medicine at the Queen Mary Veterans Hospital, both in Montreal. After completing a dermatology residency at the University of Pennsylvania, he joined the faculty at the University of Illinois College of Medicine. He served as Chairman of the Dermatology Department at the University of Illinois from 1974-1995.

During his chairmanship, the number of residents increased from two to 12, and a total of 175 residents completed their training. Relationships were established with Loyola University, West Side and Hines Veterans Administration Hospitals, and Michael Reese Hospital. In 1990, a Mohs surgery fellowship was started in the department. Dr. Solomon held several administrative positions at the University of Illinois Medical School: president of the medical staff, acting medical director of the University of Illinois Hospital, and associate dean at the University of Illinois College of Medicine. After leaving the University, Larry was in private practice in Park Ridge and Glenview seeing mostly pediatric dermatology patients.

His many honors include the Gold Medal Award for the most original scientific exhibit at the American Academy of Dermatology annual meeting and first prize for a scientific exhibit at the American Academy of Allergy. In recognition of Dr. Solomon's teaching skills, he received the Golden Apple Award, the Faculty Member of the Year Award and the Distinguished Faculty Award from the U. of I.

Dr. Solomon was the author of over 90 scientific papers, 22 book chapters, eight books, one monograph and seven abstracts. Neonatal Dermatology, written by Drs. Solomon and Nancy Esterly, has been printed in English, Spanish and Italian. He also wrote extensively on neonatal dermatology and was recognized worldwide as an expert in this field. He served as an editorial board member of The International Journal of Dermatology, chief associate editor of The Journal of Investigative Dermatology, and co-editor of Pediatric Dermatology. He was elected to membership in the American Dermatological Association and the Chicago Dermatological Society (servlng as president in 1977), and received the Society's Gold Medal Award for outstanding service and academic excellence in 1997. He was also a member of the Royal College of Physicians and Surgeons, the Society for Dermatogenetics, the American Society of Dermatological Genetics (president 1975-1976), and the Association of Professors of Dermatology.

Dr. Solomon's main interest outside of dermatology was his collection of rare books numbering in the

thousands. He is survived by his wife, Mieke, daughter, Deborah Ehrlich, M.D.; son, Marcus Solomon, M.D., and grandchildren, Sonia, Max, Samuel, and Ally.

MY FATHER WAS a wonderful family man. Although happy with our home in Highland Park, my dad decided to find us a summer home up north in Wisconsin. We would set out every weekend, meet a realtor, and visit houses. This went on for several years and we always went as a family. The fun part was that after seeing the homes my dad would say: "Where shall we eat?" This was the best part of the whole adventure because my dad loved to eat and find new places to dine every weekend. We eventually found a little house up in Crooked Lake, Wisconsin. We would go there every weekend (if possible) in the summer. Many fond family memories will always remain in my mind.

Dad was an outstanding pediatric dermatologist and this is what he will forever be remembered for. He taught many medical students and residents as head of the Department of Dermatology at the University of Illinois. I, his only daughter, was never aware of my dad's fame until I was in the medical field myself. We would always have a "residents" picnic at our home every summer. The residents would come to our home with their families and I was in charge of entertaining the children. Eventually, I became a physician and started understanding the hierarchy of the medical world from student to attendings. The more contact I had with medical professionals, the more I heard "Larry Solomon, he's a genius you know; he can make a diagnosis from across the room that no one else could." I began to realize that my dad was no ordinary dermatologist. I would hear about his lectures to the medical students. One in particular stands out: My dad walked in and said "Let's talk about skin color" and went on to discuss all the different colors skin could have and what disease process was associated with that color.

He eventually came to join me at Lutheran General Hospital in 1995 when I was a resident. I would see my dad walking down the hall and many people would stop and talk to him. It was great to have a patient downstairs in the clinic and call upstairs to him and say, "Dad, got a minute? I have a derm question for you." He was always thrilled to teach. He loved children. So that kids would not be afraid of him when he saw them at the U of I, he would hand the kids a quarter. Eventually at Lutheran it got up to a dollar. I would hear the kids leaving the clinic saying, "Hey mom, that doctor gave me a dollar!"

From about 10 years of age, my father was a rare book collector. These books were his pride and joy. He wanted to be surrounded by his books in his own home until he died. He spent many years frequenting book

NU was willing to give her a lab for research, and Department Chair Dr. Samuel Bluefarb agreed that her achievements

would enhance the department. Her laboratory was the first dermatology laboratory at the university, focusing on acne and hair disorders. Appointments as professor and vice-chair of the department followed.

Ruth was a key faculty member in the training of many dermatology residents during her tenure of more than three decades at Northwestern. Her outstanding knowledge of medicine, interest in basic science research, emphasis on awareness of individual patient characteristics and symptoms, and accurate diagnostic laboratory interpretations led to an application of evidence-based dermatological therapeutic regimens that were ahead of their time and a rewarding educational experience for all of us training at Northwestern.

She was the first woman to serve on the NIH Council, which ultimately determines grant funding, and served as well on many NIH study sections. She was the Editor-in-Chief of the Journal of Investigative Dermatology from 1977-1982. She also served on the Board of Directors and then as President of the Society for Investigative Dermatology. In recognition of her contributions, the Society of Investigative Dermatology awarded Dr. Freinkel the Stephen Rothman Medal, its highest honor.

OUR PRESIDENT: LAWBENCE CHAN, M.D.



Lawrence S. Chan, M.D., has been chairman of the Department of Dermatology at the University of Illinois in Chicago since 2005. Dr. Chan's accomplishments are all the more remarkable when one considers his background. After he finished his junior year in high school in mainland China, a "cultural revolution" began. A subsequent government order required all school-aged young people to be farmers all over the country. Lawrence, as well as millions of other young people, lost their educational opportunities. He determined not to be caged by the communist system. After one unsuccessful attempt and a brief imprisonment, Lawrence literally swam to freedom to Hong Kong in 1972. He immigrated to the United States in

Without a formal high school education, Lawrence learned English in the evenings while working during the day as an apartment maintenance man in Washington, D.C. Shortly after he developed some command of English, he was admitted as a special student to Montgomery College, a two-year community college in a suburb of Washington. Two years later, Lawrence graduated and was admitted to the Massachusetts Institute of Technology (as a transfer student). Majoring in life sciences and chemical engineering, he earned both B.S. degrees in 1981. He then entered the University of Pennsylvania School of Medicine.

1975 under the sponsorship of his uncle.


After graduating with a M.D. degree in 1985, Lawrence took a one-year post-doctoral fellowship position in biochemistry at the University of Pennsylvania. After his internship, Lawrence spent the next four years at the University of Michigan in Ann Arbor for his dermatology residency and immuno-dermatology fellowship training. His works during that period of time resulted in 26 peer-reviewed biomedical journal articles. Significantly, he discovered a case of autoimmune blistering skin disease characterized by an autoantibody to a novel, 105-kD sized, skin basement membrane protein, which subsequently enabled him to apply and obtain an independent R01 research grant from the National Institute of Health to study this new protein.

After a brief stay at Wayne State University, Lawrence served as Assistant Professor and Director of the Immuno-dermatology Unit at Northwestern University (from 1993 to 2002). In 2002, Lawrence moved to the University of Illinois in Chicago. Immediately after he became the department head, he used his own resources to endow a research fund for the department. A former physician partner of Orville J. Stone, M.D. who was a graduate of the University of Illinois Medical School endowed a separate fund – the first ever professorship for the department of dermatology. As a result, Dr. Chan became the inaugural recipient of this endowed professorship. This year Dr. Chan initiated another endowment drive to establish the Iris K. Aronson, M.D. Fund.

Laboratory research has always been Dr. Chan's passion. He has continued to investigate the pathophysiology of atopic dermatitis, using a mouse model he generated while on the faculty of Northwestern University. His research pointed to a major role of interleukin-4, a Th2 type cytokine, in the induction of atopic dermatitis. Not only did he show that the interleukin-4 was able to cause a variety of immune milieu changes that trigger and maintain skin inflammation, he was also able to show that the interleukin-4 was able to disrupt the skin barrier function and substantially reduce the production of certain essential skin barrier proteins.

As this year's CDS president, Dr. Chan is enjoying the opportunity to interact with many outstanding physician colleagues and invited speakers. Other than his professional works, Lawrence's personal interests include international travel, Italian food, Chinese calligraphy, painting, and photography. Dr. Chan is married with one daughter.

STUDY ON ATOPIC DERMATITIS

A Multicenter, Randomized, Double-Blind, Vehicle-Controlled Study of the Safety and Efficacy of AN2728 Topical Ointment, 2% in Children. Adolescents, and Adults (Ages 2 Years and Older) With Atopic Dermatitis

Atopic dermatitis (AD) is a distinctive eczematous condition that affects 10-20% of children in the US. AN2728 is an oxaborole compound developed as a topical anti-inflammatory agent.

This trial will study the safety and efficacy of AN2728 topical ointment applied twice daily versus vehicle in children, adolescents, and adults. Participation requires patients to complete a dosing diary twice daily and attend weekly clinic visits.

The duration of patient participation is between 36 days and 71 days, depending on the length of the washout period required prior to AN2728 application. Eligible subjects may have the option to enter an openlabel, long-term safety extension study.

Patient Population for the study listed above: children (ages 2-11 years, inclusive), adolescents (ages 12-17 years, inclusive), and adults (≥18 years) with mild-to-moderate atopic dermatitis involving ≥5% treatable percent body surface area

Jonathan's clinical interests are in the areas of atopic and contact dermatitis and photobiology. He is the founder and director of the Northwestern Multidisciplinary Eczema Center and has created the first-in-kind multidisciplinary eczema clinic in collaboration with specialists from allergy-immunology, sleep medicine and psychiatry. He is also engaged in a number of ongoing trials for novel therapeutics for atopic dermatitis, including dupilumab and epremilast. Jonathan's research interests are in the areas of the epidemiology, comorbidities, and quality of life of atopic dermatitis.
